Please join us for the 2018 season opening event at the Frontenac Museum as we honor and commemorate the 100th anniversary of the end of World War I.

Greeters will be dressed in period attire as they welcome you. A continuous showing of WWI information and pictures will be provided by Professor John Lamphere of Cayuga Community College. Displays to commemorate the 100th anniversary will be throughout the Museum. A scavenger hunt for children and adults will be a great way to learn about the museum and its contents. World War I period music will be provided. The newest exhibit on the Hamlet of Mapleton will be a sure stop on your visit, as well as viewing the many artworks by local artists along the corridor walls. The remainder of the exhibit rooms will be open, including Native American artifacts, war memorabilia, former pharmacy cures and information. Docents will be in each of the five exhibit areas to answer questions and point out interesting pieces. And finally, enjoy refreshments with friends and neighbors!

The Museum is Open from May 20th to October 20th this year. The open hours are 1 to 4pm on Saturdays and Sundays. It is a wonderful time to visit the Museum and view exhibits and local historical information. There are many rooms to visit including the Union Springs Room, the School Room, the War Room, and the Native American Room. The hallways are replete with beautiful paintings from local artists and the Community room has many exciting displays as well.

Last year the Museum welcomed almost 350 visitors to the Museum exhibits and its Lecture Series. Volunteers partnered with Union Springs Schools to participate in "Read Across America" and to introduce students to "Old Fashioned Games". "Read Across America" is sponsored by Kohl's Department Store.

Volunteers are the backbone of maintaining the Museum and last year gave over 1,000 hours to maintain the property and the exhibits. Our Board of Directors has 17 volunteers who give much in terms of hours, ideas and direction to continuously improve the Museum. 

THANK YOU—TOWN OF SPRINGPORT!

The Town of Springport recently discovered several historic documents in their vault. The Springport Board and Jennifer Schenck and Tiffany Potter, from the Town Office, recognized the importance of these documents and reached out to the Frontenac Museum to determine our interest. As a result, we are now in possession of the following: (1) Book of Chattel Mortgages covering the years 1887-1942. (2) Two bound books of the Overseer of the Poor. (3)1865 Civil War Record. (4)1939 map of Frontenac Island. (5) Maps of the six Nations of the Iroquois Confederacy. (6)1859 map of Cayuga County. (7) Map of Cayuga and Seneca Lakes. (8) Updated physical map of Cayuga County. It is our honor to preserve these items and make them accessible to the public.

DID YOU KNOW?

On July 18, 1930, NYS Governor Franklin Delano Roosevelt decided to tour the Barge Canal System on his yacht. He began his journey in Albany and sailed the length of the Barge Canal and Cayuga Lake on his way to Ithaca.

The governor stopped at Cayuga Lake State Park, where he addressed a crowd of about 2,000 people. Throngs of people visited the Pavilion's dance floor and porches. Police officers sought to keep the audience back from the surrounding veranda, fearing the structure might collapse!

People on this side of the lake hoped to catch a glimpse of Mr. Roosevelt's yacht. The original plan called for his yacht to come close to shore, where the governor would be welcomed with a speech by the mayor of Union Springs and the presentation of flowers, etc. Unfortunately, due to the shallowness of the water, the yacht could not approach the shoreline. Therefore, Bob "Doc" Doremus, a teenager at the time, was quickly appointed to take Mayor Harry S. Clark, Margaret Bradley, and other local dignitaries in Mrs. Bradley's boat to dock near Frontenac Island, where the governor's yacht had dropped anchor. Bob steered the boat to the island and tied up alongside Mr. Roosevelt's vessel. Mrs. Roosevelt came up on deck and graciously accepted the flowers and a platter of Mrs. Bradley's prized date nut bread. The Roosevelts were delighted with the gifts from the people of Union Springs. The Roosevelts' sons came up on deck, too, and visited with Bob. They asked if there was good fishing in the lake and what one might expect to catch. Then the Roosevelt party continued south and landed at Aurora, where many people from Union Springs had driven in their cars, hoping to catch a closer look at the governor.

MARGARET BRADLEY'S DATE NUT BREAD RECIPE

Makes one loaf.



1 c. chopped dates

1 c. boiling water (or the juice of an orange, if desired)

1 t. baking soda

1 T. butter

3/4 c. white sugar

1 t. vanilla

1 egg, separated

Pinch of salt

13/4 c. sifted white flour

1 t. baking powder

3/4 c. chopped walnuts

Preheat oven to 300 degrees. Line the bottom of a 9 ½" loaf pan with waxed paper or parchment paper. In a medium mixing bowl, pour boiling water over the chopped dates. Stir in baking soda, let stand for 5 minutes. In a large mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Stir in vanilla, beaten egg yolk and salt. Stir in flour, baking powder, walnuts and dates. Mix well. Turn batter into lined loaf pan. [Sprinkle with white sugar, if desired.] Bake in preheated oven for 45 minutes to one hour. Carefully remove from the pan and lay on its side on a cooling rack.
